Quartermaster's Corner

It looks like spring is finally arriving as the last few days have been beautiful. The Commander has appointed a committee to come up with some Post policies. The first

one I'm working on is a policy for using the Hall. This policy will lay out the requirements to use the hall for an event as well as renting the hall. Once drawn up, the policy will go to the House committee for approval and, if approved, it will go to the general membership for final approval. There are a couple of other issues we're looking at writing a policy for as well. We feel if we have a written policy, everyone will know what is expected in order to host an event.

For a while now, the bartenders have been told to use the measure when pouring liquor. The automatic pourers we have don't always pour exactly an ounce and a half like we want, so we had them use the measure. We are going to start enforcing this policy with the bartenders. We feel an ounce and a half of liquor for the prices we're charging is a good value. We've gotten notices of price increases from two of our vendors in the last week and we're trying to keep our prices as they are and still pay the bills.

Speaking of bartenders, because of some recent issues, the House Committee and the general membership passed some new policies to hold the bartenders accountable for properly following the procedures of the Post. We are instituting a three strikes and you're out policy. (con't)

The bartenders can get a strike if they don't use the measure to pour liquor, if the door is unlocked, if a transaction isn't rung into the register immediately, or if the bar bag is not correct. After three strikes, the bartender will no longer be able to tend bar at the Post. We realize they are volunteers, but when they assume the job they also assume the responsibilities that come with the job.

Another issue that passed the general membership meeting is that we will no longer sell split buckets of beer. A split bucket is 3 bottles of one kind and 2 bottles of another kind of beer. We have no way of tracking the inventory when selling the split buckets other than the bartender writing it down and when they are busy, they just don't have the time to do this.

If you have issues with the bartenders, please don't give them a hard time. Bring your issues to the attention of the Canteen Manager or a Post officer.

The last issue I want to discuss is the front door. We get a lot of complaints saying the front door is always locked. There

is a motion sensor inside that unlocks the door so a person can leave the building. This is a safety requirement that must be in place. The problem is when the Post is busy and the bar crowded, if someone is standing within a few feet of the door, the sensor picks up the movement and unlocks the door. Also when you leave or enter the building after the door closes, there is a five second delay until it locks again. It's easy to determine if the door is locked or not. Behind the bar at the end of the liquor racks, there is a toggle switch that the bartender uses to turn off the door to allow someone in when they ring the bell. If the toggle switch is up, the door is locked. If the toggle is down, the door is unlocked. All you need to do is look at the toggle switch and you can tell if the door is locked or not. Again please don't give the bartenders a hard time about the door. If you have a problem, bring it to the attention of the Canteen Manager of a Post officer.
